Ms. Krenelka and Mr. Mochoruk provided an update on the UND Strategic Planning process. The strategic planning committee has been chosen containing faculty, staff, and students. The full committee met for the time last week. The plan is to hear from all facets of the university through several meetings including an online feedback form. Workgroups will be developed to gain additional information and data to make informed decisions that are not predetermined. Additional information and timelines can be found on the Strategic Planning website.

8.

Mr. Correll provided an update on the MWF standard class start times. Mr. Correll thanked everyone for their feedback and offered to take additional feedback until Monday, March 7, 2022. The Academic Policy and Admissions committee will meet next week to discuss the feedback as well as work on a permanent policy to meet the needs of the entire campus. For the upcoming 2022-2023 academic year, UND will continue to follow the :15 minute passing times as practiced during the previous two years.

9.

Ms. Bubach and Ms. Solberg provided an update on HLC Criterion #3. They are working on Teaching and Learning: Quality, Resources, and Support. They covered the various offices necessary for the completion of this process for our upcoming reaffirmation process.

10.

Ms. Johnson and Mr. Carmichael provided an update on HLC Criterion #4. The group is meeting every two weeks via Zoom. They have divided the work among team members. Their goal is gather the most current data sets to validate the argument.

11.

Mr. Millspaugh proved a Council of Collegiate Faculties update. A recent meeting occurred. Elections for the faculty representative on the SBHE. The CCF adopted a resolution regarding HB 1508 from last legislative cycle.

12.

Mr. Schill provided a Staff Senate update. Nominations for next academic year officers are next week. The Spring Fling event will be happening on April 7, 2022.

13.

Mr. Reedy provided a Student Government update. A resolution was passed on creating a Parking Services committee. Students are anxious to provide feedback. Student Government is discussing the green bandana project. The campus community would be training on mental health issues. Those who complete training receive a green bandana.

14.

Mr. Link stated the enrollment numbers remain positive. Total numbers of students has risen. The credit hour production numbers were slightly lower.

Mr. Link stated that we had nearly a three percentage point increase in fall to spring retention.

Dr. Maridee Shogren is the named Interim Dean for the College of Nursing and Professional Disciplines.

The search for the Dean of the School of Graduate Studies is now live.

The work on the Merrifield/Twamley project is ongoing. There has been great feedback, and it has been provided to the architecture group.

There has been a great amount of work on strategic investment projects to include shared governance and feedback.

There is a new major on campus - eSports, the first of its kind in the state of North Dakota.

There is work on adjusting the New Student Fee. It could be lowered from \$200 to \$185.

The impact of the Ukraine invasion has affected the UND community especially to our armed services members taking classes.

Without objection, the minutes from the February 3, 2022, University Senate meeting were filed.

17.

Ms. Oancea reported from the Senate Executive Committee in February. A resolution on defending academic freedom to teach about race and gender justice and critical race theory is being developed. NDSU, the ND Student Association, and the Council of College Faculties have already developed resolutions. The Senate Budget Committee has submitted a charge revision for consideration. The Essential Studies Committee has submitted a change for their annual report deadline. The Essential Studies Committee has submitted their 2021-2022 Revalidations and Validations for approval.

18.

The 20 minute question and answer period began at 4:16pm. Mr. Jendrysik asked if any of our Ukrainian national students are planning to apply for refugee status. He also asked if the Alumni Foundation had any Russian investments and if they plan to diversify. Mr. Link did not have those answers, but will try to locate them. Ms. Gjellstad asked about support committees that do not exist anymore. Mr. Shabb stated that those committees were terminated during President Kennedy's term in office. Mr. Shivers stated that the University Space Committee might be reinstated. Mr. Armacost supported the work done towards shared governance. Mr. Kehn asked why departments are paying more in tuition waivers for international students. Mr. Link will have to investigate the model and its history. Mr. Shivers stated that the management of waivers may be at the college level. There is an expense to tuition waivers. Mr. Newman stated that this is a fixed pool of money at the department level that could lead us to miss out on the recruitment of talented students. The question and answer period ended at 4:38pm.

University of North Dakota Resolution on Defending Academic Freedom

RATIONALE:

WHEREAS the North Dakota Century Code (NDCC) [Chapter 15-10.4](#) and the State Board of Higher Education (SBHE) [Policy 401.1](#) affirm the importance of academic freedom to the proper functioning of universities, in line with the American Association of University Professors' [1940 statement of Principles on Academic Freedom and Tenure](#), by virtue of which faculty, who are experts in their respective disciplines, have responsibility for curriculum; and

Review of Goals

The goals/plans for 2021 - 2022 were outlined at the end of the previous academic year with goal #5 added at the beginning of the 2021-2022 academic year as follows:

1. Review assessment data to develop recommendations for the University Senate and UND Online
2. Define what “successful” retention of online students means
3. Work with UND Online to better track online students
4. Develop retention strategies for online students
5. Understand the different modes of course delivery including online and face-to-face.

Summary of Committee Activities for 2021 - 2022

The Senate Online and Distance Education Committee met 6 times per Zoom during the 2021 - 2022 academic year (more specifically between September and March), with one additional meeting scheduled in April after the submission of this report. Rhoda Owens serves as Chair and Heather Terrell served as Past Chair during the 2021-2022 academic year. Jennifer Reichert was elected as Vice Chair for the 2021 – 2022 Academic Year and will serve as Chair for the 2022-2023 Academic Year.

- Fall semester, the committee reviewed the survey data reports containing the data results collected during the 2020-2021 academic year by the subcommittee. Originally this survey was done because the committee decided to prioritize Item 6 of the committee’s goals: “What was learned from the rapid shift to all remote instruction and how that can inform future needs of the university in terms of expanding online instruction?” Another purpose of this survey was to create an opportunity to gather information about how the university can better meet the needs of its students in the future. Lastly, the information gained from this assessment may be useful to the Task Force for the Future of Education at UND, or in the implementation of the Task Force recommendations. Three Qualtrics surveys (students, staff, and faculty) were emailed and posted to the Blackboard shells from April 8, 2021, to May 6, 2021. Subcommittee members included Heather Terrell, Rhoda Owens, Tim Burrows, Lynette Krenelka, and Amy Carlson. The report was made available on the shared committee’s TEAMS site. The survey results are available to committee members and other UND committees upon request. The UND On-Line team prepared reports from the data results of the three surveys and shared the results February 2022 with the Provost and Deans (see attached reports).
- During the fall semester, members reviewed the committee’s charge (functions/responsibilities, purpose) and goals for the 2021 – 2022 academic year. These documents were used to guide the committee’s work throughout the year.

- To meet Goal #5, UND's registrar's office presented on the definitions for modes of course delivery. The terms and definitions are used by NDUS and available on the website.
- The committee served as a forum for members. Committee work primarily focused on updates about the ongoing challenges associated with online student recruitment, retention, and learning and access to academic technologies. Faculty development opportunities on best practices for online/distance students offered by TTaDA were communicated to members. Committee members advised UND Online, TTaDA, and Senate as related to the committee's charge and goals. In addition, changes and updates were provided to the committee members to help meet our six goals for the 2021 – 2022 academic year. All pertinent information was communicated and disseminated to colleges and departments by committee members.
- A subcommittee including members from SODEC to begin assessing and evaluating how online faculty are evaluated by students for teaching effectiveness and excellence. At present, the SELFI is used to evaluate all faculty in multiple teaching roles (faciliatory, course lead, course developer, instructor, etc.).
- During the Spring semester, the committee discussed the current charge of the committee and how best to spend our time as a committee during the 2022-2023 academic year. The committee identified three primary roles or areas of focus for the near future (the current academic year and 2022 -2023 academic year), all of which fall within the purview of the current committee charge:

Goals for the 2022-2023 Academic Year

- Advise UND Online and TTaDA in determining initiatives based on the SODEC Faculty, Staff, and Student survey results.
- Communicate online instruction faculty development opportunities to department faculty that are offered by UND, TTaDA, and other outside organizations.
- Develop strategies to promote diversity, equity, and inclusion content in online education courses.
